

WALLINGFORD - What's it like to get thousands of Oldsmobile lovers in one place for a national car show? For Walling-

ford's Glen Morris, the show co-chairman, it's a rush, and a lot of work.

"It's exhilarating to say the least. It's thrilling," he said.

Morris and fellow co-chairman Bill Black, of Guilford, members of the New England Oldsmobile Club, will host the Oldsmobile Club of America Nationals next week, July 21 to 25, in Sturbridge, Mass. It's the first time the national show will be held in New England.

The show includes car judging, banquets and trips to local attractions such as Mohegan Sun Casino and Mystic Seaport. Morris expects about 400 cars and thousands of car owners, families and friends. "We basically took over Sturbridge," he said. "It's a vacation for Oldsmobile lovers." It won't be a vacation for Morris or Black, though. As co-chairmen, they've been coordinating lodging, food, judging and Oldsmobile clubs from across the country in preparation for the show. Morris has judged in national shows before, but next week he won't have the time.

"We've been working on it for three years," he said. "To host a national event is a huge event." Morris said a number of members of the New England club will help run the event and judge cars. "You need your club to really step up," he said.

Morris said it's fitting that on the 40th anniversary of the national club, the show will be held in New England, where the club began. The New England club still has one of the original national club members, according to Morris.

Morris has two 1969 Oldsmobile Cutlasses, one of which he completely overhauled in time for the 1993 nationals. The work, over several years, paid off: The car got in the firstplace category. "Everybody has their weaknesses," he said explaining his affinity for Oldsmobiles. "We like them."

Black is the third owner of a 1970 Oldsmobile Cutlass Supreme convertible first owned by George Weiss, the late Yankees general manager and Mets president. Black said the car runs perfectly and despite its size and age gets decent highway gas mileage. In its time, the high-end car sold

for about \$3,500, Black said.

"I always wanted to get a muscle car of some sort," Black said. For added authenticity at car shows, he displays an original, unused tire from an Oldsmobile he keeps in the trunk, although Black said he'd never use it.

Morris said the Sturbridge show is open to the public. Information is available at www.neolds.com.

Participants started arriving as early as Saturday and some were seen milling around the host hotel over the weekend.

Monday had a few folks in the hotel, Tuesday the members and volunteers really started to get things into position, setting up registration as well as the show field itself. It looked as if we would have plenty of elbow room in the swap meet as there were still spaces left on Tuesday. The indoor car display area was starting to show quite a variety of both Oldsmobiles as well as go-karts and pedal cars (good thing we kept Richter out of the go-karts). Being in New England, allowed several prominent local collectors to display cars that have not previously been displayed at a national meet. Hopefully you got to see this incredible collection of vehicles.

Wednesday, the participants started to arrive in earnest. The swap meet was also filling up, both in terms of the registered vendors as well as additional folks filling the previously available spots. A couple afternoon showers and the threat of potentially heavier rain prompted the move of the Welcome Reception indoors. While this took place I was working the lot and trying to get folks to unload their trailers around the parking lot that was in the process of having areas paved. Other than an errant semi looking to grab a meal, it was pretty uneventful in the lot (except for getting wet)!

Once again the rain kept a lot of the "box cars" hidden in their trailers until judging on Friday morning. In an ironic twist, Friday's rain got 'em ALL wet anyway!

Judging started out hot and humid and progressed to hot and wet. While the judging crew I was on did a fairly good job of moving through the classes we were assigned, some others thought the rains would subside and ended up completing judging in a rather substantial rain shower as opposed to a light drizzle.

Bill and Glen rearranged the order of the presentations so that the specialty awards were not handed out to an empty room. In addition, the awards ended at a reasonable time (hours earlier than previous events) giving everyone more time to socialize and relax with friends they weren't going to see for another year.

Sunday found most folks hitting the road for the journey home, hopefully safe and uneventful one at that. Members of the host club were packing and picking up. As we were relaxing and contemplating how much more fun it will be next year when we are mere participants.

After not only seeing "behind the scenes" at the Nationals but also having the "inside track" by being part of the host club. It is easy to see how easily hindsight can show you better ways of handling many of the issues. The problem with this is the 3+ years of planning and preparation that went into them. We all know you can't please all the people all of the time, but never is that more evident than planning an event for a large (yet unknown how large until just before the event) amount of people.

Thanks to all who attended. Nancy and I enjoyed your company...again.



From the North, East and West;

From I-84, take Rout 2 south out of Hartford towards Norwich/new London. At SR-2 Exit 5C, turn off onto Ramp. Turn LEFT (East) onto Maple St. for 1.0 mile. Turn RIGHT (South) onto Forbes St. for 0.2 mi.

Turn LEFT (East) onto O'Connell Dr. and go 0.4 mi. to #139.

From the South;

From I-91 (North) get off at Exit 25-26, for CT-3 / Glastonbury / Old Wethersfield.

Merge onto SR-3 [Maple St] (North) for 1.4 mi. Turn off onto Ramp and proceed 0.3 mi to Main St / Glastonbury. Turn LEFT (East) onto Glastonbury Blvd for 0.3 mi.

Continue (East) on Griswold St. for 0.6 mi.

Turn LEFT (North) onto Prospect St for 0.4 mi. Continue (North) after Prospect turns into Forbes St for 0.2 mi. Turn RIGHT (East) onto O'Connell Dr. Go 0.4 mi to #139

Note: If you are using a GPS, you may have to use "Berlin" for town name instead of Kensington

From Hartford and points north: I-91 South to Exit 22N (Route 9 North). Follow route 9 North for 2.5 miles. Take Exit 22. At the bottom of the ramp (there will be a vacant car dealership to your left), take left onto Frontage Rd. Follow Frontage Rd to the end (approx 2/10 mi). At the traffic light, take left onto Webster Square Rd. Follow Webster Square Rd to the end (approx 3/10 mi). Take right onto Mill St. Follow Mill St (Becomes Farmington Ave) for 4/10 mi, to second traffic light. Take left onto Lower Lane. Follow Lower Lane for 4/10 mi. #228 will be the white house on the right.

From the South: Take I-91 North to Exit 22N for Route 9 North and Proceed as above.

From the East: Take I-84 West to I-91 South and proceed as above.

From the West: Take I-84 East to Exit 39A for Route 9 South. Follow Route 9 South for 7.5 Miles to Exit 23 for Christian Lane. At end of ramp take right onto Christian Lane and proceed to the second traffic light (1/2 mi). Take a left onto Farmington Ave. Follow Farmington Ave for 3/10 Mi to first traffic light. Take right onto Lower Lane. Follow Lower Lane for 4/10 Mi. #228 will be the white house on the right.
